They came between 1948 and 1971.

The people who migrated to Britain in this period brought with them many foods that a now part of British life: rice and peas, plantain, curry, samosas and jerk chicken.

They also brought new forms of music such as bhangra, calypso and reggae!









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The British Empire: For hundreds of years, Britain invaded and took over many countries around the world. These formed part of the British Empire.

Caribbean: The Caribbean is the sea which contains a cluster of islands between the West Indies, Central America, and the north coast of South America.

Independence: During the 1950s and 1960s, the countries in the British Empire became independent and began to rule themselves.

Commonwealth: a group of countries that were formerly part of the British Empire.

Migration: movement of people to a new area or country in order to find work or better living conditions.

Migrant: a person who moves from one place to another to find work or batter living conditions...

Immigrant: a person who comes to live from a different country.

Refugee: a person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster.

Culture: the different ways in which people live their lives. This may include their beliefs and customs such as the food they eat and the music they make.
